

# School Attendance

School attendance remains high on everyone's agenda, especially since the introduction of the new Statutory Requirements and expectations of each pupil securing above 95% attendance. As in previous years Pastoral Teams have focused their energy on rewarding students, the difference this academic year is that there are more weekly rewards notably Queue Jumps that are proving to be a huge success with pupils. Specifically, Year 8 are running a Race to School contest which will see the winning Form have a whole week's worth of Queue Jump passes.

As the New Year approaches there is a big focus on ensuring full attendance especially during the winter months. Regular attendance helps maintain a routine, which can contribute to a student's mental well-being and overall academic performance especially as missing school regularly may cause stress or anxiety about catching up.

Research continues to show that there is a direct correlation between regular school attendance and better academic outcomes. Students who attend school regularly are more likely to achieve higher GCSE grades compared to those with poor attendance and this is no exception here at Chesterfield High School: our figures have shown that across all subjects on average students with 95% and above attendance achieve ½ grade higher than their predictions and have an average result of a grade 6. Whereas those with below 84% attendance on average achieved 1½ grades lower than their predictions and have an average result of a grade 3.

# Year 9 School Trip to Edge Hill University





# **Inspiring** Day

On the 28th November, a small group of Year 9 students embarked on an exciting school trip to Prenton Park, Tranmere, to participate in the Unilever STEM Project.

The event, designed to inspire and engage young minds in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, brought together schools from across the region for a day


filled with innovation, teamwork, and hands-on learning.

Prenton Park, home to Tranmere Rovers Football Club, provided a unique and dynamic setting for the event. The Unilever STEM Project aimed to showcase the real-world applications of STEM subjects and to ignite a passion for these fields among the next generation. Students were introduced to the ways Unilever incorporates STEM in their business, from developing sustainable packaging to advancing product innovation.

Upon arrival, the students were welcomed by the event organizers and given a brief overview of the day. The group was then divided into teams and rotated through a series of interactive workshops and challenges, each designed to develop problem-solving skills, critical thinking, and teamwork. The activities were diverse and engaging, ranging from coding tasks to hands-on engineering challenges, such as designing a sustainable structure or solving real-world problems inspired by Unilever's work in the fields of science and technology.

One highlight of the day was a session where students explored the chemistry behind everyday products, such as shampoos and soaps. They learned about the scientific processes involved in creating these products and were given the opportunity to experiment with their own formulations under the guidance of Unilever professionals. It was a fantastic opportunity for the students to connect classroom learning with real-world applications, fostering a sense of excitement and curiosity about the possibilities that STEM holds.

# Computer Science & Business

Our Year 9 students have been investigating cyber security, looking at different threats online and what they need to be aware of when using their phones and computers. Are they cyber aware, ensuring they have strong passwords and protecting all of their data online. The have started to analyse the impact of artificial intelligence, when using self-driving cars.

Year 8 have been thinking like a computer, investigating binary and how this represents characters and information in a computer. They can talk like a computer and are able to convert between binary and denary numbers. They have also been creating pixel images on the computer and debating the impact of photo shopping photos on society.

Year 7 have been able to learn how a computer works, they are able to use Google drive confidently and send appropriate emails to staff members. They have been updating on us how their summer has been, and issues associated with cyber bullying. Additionally, pupils have been given the opportunity to understand the 4 main cornerstones of computational thinking, identifying real life scenarios were abstraction, pattern recognition, decomposition and algorithms are used.

Year 10 were able to have an afternoon with Young Enterprise looking at different types of business and how they work. They were able to create a marking campaign looking at logos, adverts and what they could do to make customers choose them over their competitors.

# Criminology

In November, the **Y13 students** had the opportunity to visit Liverpool Crown Court as part of their study of Criminology. They have studied the process of trials and influences on the outcome of trials, and found this a rewarding experience to see it in action. Libby Lennie has recorded her thoughts on the day.....

"My experience at the Crown Courts in Liverpool has benefitted me by improving my understanding of how a courtroom works. We observed a trial consisting of two defendants, who had been involved in a drug altercation, during which there was a cross examination where the prosecutor presented an interview script to the jury, and asked the defendant to clarify certain aspects. The defendant's barrister then asked his own questions in order to clarify the points that he wanted to get across. Attending this trial gave me an insight into the career I wish to pursue, which is becoming a criminal solicitor and it gave me a chance to experience what it would be like attending a court hearing. As the session was coming to an end we were able to have a conversation with the prosecuting barrister, in which he shared insight into his perspective on the case and what would happen as the trial developed"



Our Year 12 Criminology pupils attended an event at Anfield Stadium in partnership with LFC Foundation. Pupils participated in a mock trial (of which one of our own got to be head judge!) and they had an interactive Q&A session with Judges and Barristers about their experiences working in the criminal justice system.





# Geography Field Work

### Year 7 Geography Field Work Rimrose Valley Country Park

Our Year 7 geography field trip to Rimrose Valley Country Park was an exciting opportunity to explore the natural environment and study local geography. The trip focused on investigating whether a new road should be built through the park to connect to the Liverpool 2 docks. We conducted an environmental quality survey to assess factors like pollution, noise, and vegetation, which helped us understand the potential impacts of the proposed road. Students also completed questionnaires, asking park visitors for their opinions on the project. Additionally, we used a decibel reader to measure noise levels in different areas, considering how construction and traffic might affect the park. This fieldwork gave us valuable insights into the environmental and social implications of the proposed development.

Following the trip, Stu Bennett from Rimrose Valley Friends came into school to run an assembly for Year 7. He discussed the potential impacts of the new road on the local environment and community. Stu's talk helped consolidate our learning and gave us insight into the work of the charity in protecting the park. The proposed A5036 Port of Liverpool Access Road, which would have linked Switch Island to the port, has now been cancelled, 7 years after National Highways announced its preferred route, through Rimrose Valley Country Park. A great result for our local community!



### **Borderscapes Project with the University of Liverpool**



This year, our Year 10 students had the incredible opportunity to engage with undergraduate students from the University of Liverpool as part of the Borderscapes project. These undergraduates, who are also assistant researchers working with Dr. Jessica Hampton and Professor Stefania Tufi, delivered a series of thought-provoking lessons to our students.

The collaboration began in June 2024 when Dr. Hampton visited our Year 9 students on four occasions for the 'Borderscapes' research project. According to the University of Liverpool, "the project aims to generate new understandings of borders". During these sessions, Dr. Hampton introduced the concept of how language shapes our sense of identity and influences how we perceive the world around us. Students took part in this research project by completing questionnaires on the topic, but also explored this idea creatively by producing artwork, photography, and personalized "artefacts" that reflected their understanding of the relationship between language, nature, culture, and identity.

This year, the focus shifted to how language can act as both a bridge and a barrier in communication. Research Assistants from the University of Liverpool guided students through activities and experiments designed to illustrate these challenges. In one particularly impactful exercise, a student in each group was asked to communicate only in Spanish while the rest spoke exclusively in English. This activity provided powerful insights into the isolation non-English speakers can feel in predominantly Englishspeaking environments. It also encouraged empathy and a deeper appreciation for the struggles faced by those adapting to a new linguistic and cultural context.

The project has been an eye-opening journey for our students, broadening their perspectives and fostering empathy. To celebrate their efforts and creativity, students will attend an exhibition in January 2025 at the University of Liverpool, where their photography and other artwork will be proudly displayed.

We are immensely grateful to Dr. Hampton, Professor Tufi, and the University of Liverpool team for providing our students with this transformative experience.

### **Geography Masterclasses**

Y12 geographers have taken part in Geography masterclasses which explored the environmental and geographical aspects of composting, emphasising sustainable waste management. Y12 learnt techniques to convert organic waste into nutrient-rich compost while understanding its impact on soil health, carbon cycles, and local ecosystems.




### **Year 9 Waste Management Project**

The initiative encourages pupils to explore sustainable waste practices, raise awareness about recycling, and find creative solutions to reduce waste in their local community.

Through research, workshops and a conference day due to take place in March, the pupils are learning about environmental responsibility while directly contributing to making Liverpool a cleaner, greener place. Well done to all of those involved!

# Design Technology Term 1

The Design and Technology department have had an extremely busy term. Students across all year groups have been involved in a variety of different lessons, engaging in a variety of activities, developing new skills and gaining lots of new knowledge.

### Year 7

Year 7 students have been busy in the workshop developing skills with saws, drills, files and rasps, along with gaining knowledge or measuring, marking out, properties of materials and different types of timber, as they manufacture their passive speakers.





Year 7 students have also been busy in the kitchen, developing knife skills; learning to prepare fruits and vegetables and preparing vegetable couscous, gaining knowledge of healthy eating and nutrients, and gaining knowledge of different cooking methods.





### Year 8

Year 8 students have been busy in the design studio, developing and testing out ideas for a new drinks packaging. Students have gained knowledge of the importance of packaging, as well as different types of materials which can be used for packaging. Students have developed typography skills, creating lettering for designs which will attract customers' attention.





Year 8 students have also been busy in the kitchen gaining knowledge of coagulation as they cooked fritatta, as well as gaining knowledge of healthy eating and nutrients.



### Year 9

Year 9 students have been putting their architectural skills in to practice as they design a new school building for Chesterfield High school. Students have been learning to produce floor plans and elevations as well as gain knowledge of standard drawing conventions. Year 9 students have also been exploring the topic of sustainability, gaining knowledge of sustainable construction methods and materials.

Year 9 students have also been busy in the kitchen, developing knife skills, learning to professionally cut vegetables, gaining knowledge of healthy eating and understanding the importance of nutrients at different life stages. Students have applied their new knowledge and skills in the cooking of potato and leek soup, as well as Thai green curry.






Year 10 Construction students have made a positive start to their BTEC Construction qualification. Throughout the term, students have gained knowledge of measuring, marking out and cutting a range of wood joints, developing setting out, cutting and chiselling skills. Students have also been learning about designing buildings and the process involved in producing floor plans and elevations, as well as constructing scale models. Students have gained knowledge of proportion and scale, as well as standard drawing conventions.









Year 10 Food and Nutrition students have also made a positive start to their WJEC Food qualification. Students have been involved in cooking a variety of dishes, developing various preparation and cooking techniques, as well as learning how to present food in an appealing and professional manner.

Students have further strengthened knowledge of the importance of a balanced diet and how food supports physical and mental health, as well as studying the dietary needs of different groups, such as children, athletes, the elderly, and those with medical conditions.





### Year 11

Year 11 Construction students have been working extremely hard, completing the first of two coursework modules, for their BTEC Construction qualification. Students have been producing a client brief for a low-rise residential project, as well as submitting floor plans and elevations.





Year 11 Food and Nutrition students have been very busy further enhancing their food preparation and cooking skills, as they work towards the submission of their coursework unit. Students have been planning out and trial cooking potential dishes which they could cook as part of their practical examination.

# Climate Change Event

On November 21st, the CHS Climate Change Council participated in a mock UN Climate Change Conference with other schools from across the North West. We represented The USA – quite a challenge!

Students had the opportunity to simulate the roles of global leaders, scientists, and policymakers in addressing climate issues. Delegates represented various countries, negotiating solutions to pressing challenges such as greenhouse gas emissions, renewable energy adoption, and climate justice. Through realistic debates and the proposal of action plans, participants gained a deeper understanding of international collaboration and the complexities of climate policy.
